Actions: Creative + Relaxing + Fun = Educational = Tasty + Sensory



Fishing is fun!

Can you fish out all the objects that have fallen into the water?

What to do:

- Fill the washing-up bowl with water and put the bottle caps or small toys in it.
- Get your little one to fish them out and place them on a tea towel to dry.
- Ask your child to collect them colour by colour or by size (from smallest to largest) or by category, to help them learn how to classify objects.

What you need:

- A selection of plastic toy animals (farm animals, wild animals, pets...)
- Some small bottle caps

Who's who?

Let's take a look at some photos. Can you recognise anyone?

What to do:

- For each photo ask your child if they recognise anyone, and if so, can they name them?
- You could also include two different photos of each family member and ask your toddler to put the photos into sets.

What you need:

- A selection of family photos (printed or on a screen)

Lost and found!

Where's your toy hiding?
Go and look for it, you're sure to find it!

What you need:

- A cuddly toy, a doll, a toy car, a sweet, a book...

What to do:

1. Hide something your toddler loves and ask them to find it.
2. Give them clues like 'you're getting warmer' or 'you're getting colder' to help them find the hiding place.

Colourful night light

We're going to decorate a small glass jar with multi-coloured bits of paper to create a pretty night light.

What to do:

1. Ask your toddler to tear off lots of small pieces of tissue paper.
2. Using the brush, they can then stick these bits of paper all over the jar.
3. All that's left to do is place a small LED light inside the jar. The effect is guaranteed to please!

What you need:

- A small glass jar
- Tissue paper in different colours
- Glue varnish
- A paintbrush

Spider's web

Watch out! You're going to have to squeeze through – you don't want to touch the spider's web!

What you need:

- One or more rolls of sticky adhesive wrapping paper or masking tape
- Some chairs, or tables and/or other items of furniture...

What to do:

1. Unroll the adhesive paper or masking tape and lay several pieces of furniture (or other items in a spider's web).
2. Ask your child to make their way through the web without touching the threads. They'll want to get stuck!
3. You can tell a story with a spider as the main character to encourage your child to go on the adventure.

Spin-tastic!

Pointing with a salad spinner? Of course! Come on, you'll see!

What to do:

1. Help your child to cut out a disc of paper the size of the spinner blade. Place this disc at the bottom of the spinner basket.
2. Ask them to drop in some large glubs of paint in different colours.
3. Once the lid is firmly closed, gently spin the spinner.
4. Check out the distinct work you have created together!

What you need:

- 4 colour spray
- Liquid adhesive paper in several colours
- Some sheets of paper
- A jar of colours
- Other (optional)

5. You can also add glitter for an extra twist. It's a beautiful effect!

6. Here's another idea: your coloured disc could be used to decorate a small stool that your child makes out of cardboard.

A word of warning: don't use a real salad spinner as you can expect to get all the faces of colour out!
