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Fishing is fun!

Can you fish out of the objects that have fallen into the water?

What to do:

- Fill the washing-up bowl with water and put the bottle cap in small tins in it.
- It's up to your little one to fish them out and place them on a tea towel to dry.
- Ask your child to collect them either by colour, or by size (from smallest to largest) or by texture to help them learn how to classify objects.

What you need:

- A selection of plastic tea caddies from animals, wild animals, etc.
- Some small fabric hair ties.

Who's who?

Let's take a look at some photos. Can you recognise anyone?

What to do:

- For each photo, ask your child if they recognise anyone. And if so, can they name them?
- You could also include two different photos of each family member and ask your toddler to get the photos into pairs.

What you need:

- A selection of family photos (printed or on a screen)

Lost and found!

Where's your toy hiding? Go and look for it, you're sure to find it!

What you need:

- A ruddy toy, a doll, a toy car, a sweet, a book...

What to do:

- Hide something your toddler loves and ask them to find it.
- Give them clues like 'you're getting warmer' or 'you're getting colder' to help them find the hiding place.

Colourful night light

We're going to decorate a small glass jar with multi-coloured bits of paper to create a pretty night light.

What you need:

- A small glass jar
- Tissue paper in different colours
- Glue or varnish
- A postcard

What to do:

- Ask your toddler to tear off bits of small pieces of tissue paper.
- Using the brush they can then stick these bits of paper all over the jar.
- At half past 10 to place a small LED light inside the jar. The effect is guaranteed to please!

Spider's web

Watch out! You're going to have to squeeze through - you don't want to touch the spider's web...

What you need:

- One or more rolls of sticky adhesive wrapping paper or masking tape
- Some chairs, or tables could be used instead of furniture...

What to do:

- Unroll the adhesive paper or masking tape and wind it around several pieces of furniture to create a narrow channel with two sticky ends (in other words, a spider's web!).
- Ask your child to make their way through the web without touching the 'webs'. They don't want to get stuck!
- You can tell a story with a spider or the room characters to encourage your child to go on the adventure.

Spin-tastic!

Painting with a salad spinner? Of course! Come on, you'll see!

What you need:

- A salad spinner
- Small watercolour paints in several colours
- Some sheets of paper
- A pair of scissors
- Other (optional)

What to do:

- Help your child to cut out a disc of paper the size of the spinner basket. Place this disc at the bottom of the spinner basket.
- Ask them to dip in some large globs of paint in different colours.
- Close the lid carefully before vigorously spinning the spinner.
- Check out the abstract work you have created together!
- Here's another idea: your coloured disc could be used to decorate a small clock that your child makes out of cardboard.

A word of warning: don't use a new salad spinner as you can't expect to get all the traces of colour out!
